# Concealed Carry of Firearms by Employees

Wyoming Statute 21-3-132 permits the Board of Trustees of each school district in the state of Wyoming to adopt rules and regulations, in consultation with local law enforcement, to allow the possession of firearms on campus by employees possessing a valid concealed carry permit. The Washakie County School District #2 Board of Trustees is beginning the process of discussing this option for the Ten Sleep School. At the October 9th meeting, the Board of Trustees plan to talk with Sheriff Steve Rakness concerning his thoughts and recommendations on this issue. Interested parents and patrons are encouraged to attend and to express their thoughts about this important matter to members of the board.

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## Note to Parents

Reinforce the concept of time with your elementary schooler
Teachers put a lot of effort into teaching students about the concept of time. And there's a lot for young students to learn. What is a second, minute, hour and day? What's a week, month and year? What are past, present and future?

The more your child understands time and how it's measured, the more responsible she can be. She can be ready in 10 minutes" or estimate how much time it will take to do homework.

A real mastery of time doesn't come until later in the elementary years. But the more you can do now to help your child understand time, the better.

Have your child:

- Select a task to do. She could choose to jump up and down 50 times, draw a picture, complete three math problems, or eat a bowl of cereal.
- Estimate how many minutes it will take her to complete the task.
- Use a timer or stopwatch to track the time it takes to complete the task.
- Check to see how close her estimate was to the actual time it took.

If your child does this—estimating and verifying time—for several tasks, her sense of time will begin to improve.

Use four strategies to turn your middle schooler into a reader

Is your middle schooler less than enthusiastic about curling up with a good book? Help him learn to enjoy reading. Not only will it improve his language skills, it may turn him into a lifelong book lover!

To motivate your middle schooler to read:

- 1. Lead by example. Research shows that your reading habits can have a huge impact on your child's reading habits. So, let him see you reading for pleasure! Instead of turning on the TV when you get home from work, pick up the newspaper. On weekends, unwind with an entertaining book.
- 2. Designate daily reading time. Set aside a short period of quiet time each day when the music, TV and computer are turned off. Suggest your child use the time to read. Don't force him, though, because it could backfire. Instead, kick back with your own book and see if he follows your lead.
- Offer a book allowance. Give your child a small amount of money to spend on books each month. Comics and graphic novels may not be your idea of great literature, but if they inspire him to read, they're perfect!
- 4. Subscribe to a magazine. Look for a quality publication and consider ordering a subscription for him. Each new issue offers another opportunity to read.

Teens do most of their communicating on social media. But many don't realize that bad choices online can hurt their chances for the college or job they really want.

Of course, students have the right to free speech. But courts have set limits on what students can say in school. They can't promote drug or alcohol use. They can't use lewd or obscene speech. They can't say things that will disrupt classes or school activities.

And there's a big difference between what students are allowed to do and what they should do online. Colleges and employers check out students on social media.

Check his privacy settings. All his posts, even past posts, should be private—available only to friends. Make his passwords private. His friends should not be able to post anything on his accounts. Delete inappropriate posts. Focus on creating a positive reputation. He can share articles and photos about issues he cares about. Perhaps he can even try his hand at writing a short blog or two.

Follow colleges he's interested in attending. If he sees something that interests him, he should reach out to the school. Remember the most important piece of advice: Always think before you post.

#### Ninth Grade Authentic Learning Project and Fundraiser

To pay for Junior Prom and a Senior Trip, each secondary class at Ten Sleep does fund raising activities. It is important for every member of the class to be involved in these activities. The ninth grade class is working on fundraising to meet these goals. Fundraising projects should provide our friends and neighbors with quality goods and services. The activities also ought to be valuable learning opportunities for our students. These activities ideally will help the students develop life, career, and business skills that lead to self-reliance and prosperity.

The ninth grade class is currently working on an authentic learning project to learn life skills and earn funds for prom and the class trip. The class will be using stencils to paint addresses on the curbs in front of buildings in Ten Sleep. Government funds are not available for this project, so students will provide the service and solicit donations from residents and business owners. The goals of this authentic learning project are to gain skills in effective project planning, process research, practical math, interpersonal communication, public speaking, written communication, and technical applications. The overall objective is to give students some basic skills for starting a small business.

The project includes the following activities:

Students will research and practice the curb painting process.

Students will determine the materials and supplies needed, and develop a project budget.

Students will prepare a press release and letters for residents and business owners explaining the project, benefits of the project, and fund raising goals.

Students will prepare, practice, and present the project proposal for Town Council.

Students will apply for necessary permits.

Using satellite images and completing walking tours, students will create a detailed map of town identifying all buildings with correct address numbers.

Students will work with town administrators to identify the correct numbers on buildings without address numbers.

Students will develop and practice a sales pitch to be delivered to residents and business owners.

Students will hand deliver project letters to each address with a paintable curb.

Students will paint the curb addresses at the entrance of each building.

At each residence or business, students will leave a donation envelope and notice that the curb painting is complete.

Ten Sleep Math, Reading, and English teachers are assisting with instruction for this project. Students will always be supervised by a responsible adult and they will work in groups of two to three students. In the real world, individuals must work with many different people, not just their friends.

To prepare students for this, working groups will sometimes be created at random. Each student will work every other student in the class. Permission slips will be sent home before the class begins door to door contacts. Parents are

#### 21-3-132. Possession of firearms on school property.

- (a) The board of trustees in each school district may adopt rules and regulations, in consultation with local law enforcement, to allow the possession of firearms by employees possessing a valid concealed carry permit under W.S. 6-8-104 on or in any property or facility owned or leased by the school district. Employees of a school district who hold a valid concealed carry permit issued under W.S. 6-8-104 may carry a concealed firearm on or into school facilities or other areas designated by the board of trustees, provided the employing school district has adopted rules and regulations that allow possession of firearms on school property and the employee has received approval by the board of trustees as required by this section.
- (b) For purposes of this section, "employee" means any person employed under contract with the board of trustees of a school district, including but not limited to, superintendents, assistant superintendents, principals, assistant principals, teachers, guidance counselors, librarians, teacher's aids, coaches, business managers, secretaries or administrative assistants, janitors, bus drivers, volunteers or other employees on contract with a school district.
- (c) The rules required by subsection (a) of this section shall at a minimum:
- (i) Establish an application and approval process for employees possessing a valid concealed carry permit under W.S. 6-8-104 to carry a firearm on school property;
- (ii) Require any person carrying a firearm pursuant to this section to maintain the firearm on his person at all times or in a concealed biometric container or lock box within the direct control of the individual at all times;
- (iii) Establish ongoing training requirements, curricula and instructor qualifications, subject to approval by local law enforcement, including:
- (A) An initial course of training comprised of not less than sixteen (16) hours of live fire handgun training, and eight (8) hours of scenario based training using nonlethal training, firearms and ammunition; and

- (B) Annual firearm qualification and documented recurrent training of not less than twelve (12) hours with an approved instructor.
- (iv) Provide a process for the revocation or suspension of the authorization under this section for an employee to carry a firearm on school property.
- (d) The board of trustees in any school district may waive all or part of the training requirements of subsection (c) of this section for isolated rural schools and employees in those schools.
- (e) The superintendent of the district shall notify the parents and guardians of students attending school in the district of the ability of employees to carry firearms and the rules and regulations governing possession.
- (f) The superintendent of the district shall notify all law enforcement agencies with jurisdiction over the area of the location and names of all employees who receive permission to carry firearms from the district's board of trustees. The identities of the employees who receive permission to carry firearms from the district's board of trustees shall be confidential and are not public records for purposes of W.S. 16-4-201 through 16-4-205.
- (g) Nothing in this section shall authorize an employee to carry a firearm, concealed or otherwise, on or into any facility or other school district property without the express approval of the board of trustees and notification of parties as required by this section.
- (h) Nothing in this section shall authorize a student of a school district to carry a firearm, concealed or otherwise, on or into any facility of a school district.
- (j) Any rules and regulations adopted under this section shall only apply to persons who are employees, as defined in subsection (b) of this section.
