Principal's Corner

We are well into the second quarter of our school year and before we know it, it will be Christmas time and the close of the first semester. I am quite proud of all the accomplishments of our students this school year and I feel we have many things to celebrate and positive experiences happening here at Ten Sleep Schools.

We wanted to try a new idea in the Principal's Message called Policy Highlight. Our policy highlight will be to select a policy in the handbook that may be less-known or something that we would like community members to help improve at our school for the benefit of our students to achieve greater academic success. The policy we would like to highlight this month is a section of the attendance **Policy 5.21** which states the following:

Any student not in his/her assigned classroom by the time the second bell rings will be considered tardy for that class period. Students will not be considered tardy if they have a signed written pass from their previous classroom teacher or administrator.

Any tardy over ten (10) minutes in length without a written excuse from a teacher or administrator will result in an unexcused absence. Parent/guardian may excuse a student from a tardy that is over ten minutes in length only from first period and must do so by the start of the next school day. This will result in an excused absence for that period.

A student is allowed 4 tardies per class per semester. On the 5th tardy, a student will be placed on Step 1 of the discipline plan that will result in a 30 minute detention and notification of parent/guardian. For every two additional tardies that a student may accumulate, he/she will be placed on the next appropriate step on the discipline plan, up to a maximum of thirteen (13) tardies. At 13, the case will be reviewed in a mandatory meeting between parent and principal and then

referred to the district's disciplinary review committee.

The reason we would like to highlight this section of the attendance policy is because we have an above average amount of students who are arriving tardy to class. We would like our students and parents to reflect on the importance of punctual attendance in the learning process. Some teachers are finding it difficult to start class on time due to tardiness and this directly takes time out of the learning process in student education. We will be discussing and enforcing this policy with our students but we would request reflection, consideration and discussion among our families who attend our school. Thank you for your help and support.

After reviewing the data collected from our stakeholder survey we realized that our school here in Ten Sleep has many positives and this school is a wonderful part of our community. There are so many things that our teachers and our parents do for our community and school that our students here truly receive a great experience and education. Thanks to staff and parents for making this school and community and wonderful place to be.

In an effort to inform the community of events, safety precautions and interventions to support a more positive and safe school environment, we would like to let you know that we have partnered with Kurt Steinke, a safety and emergency preparedness specialist. Kurt uses his specialty to assess our school emergency procedures and offers professional advice on how to improve emergency procedures and general safety at our school. A team meets regularly with Kurt to improve procedures and identify possible weaknesses and turn them to strengths.

Our team has asked Kurt to make some presentations on positive school culture and bullying prevention to our students and interested members of the community. Kurt will be meeting

with grades 6-8 on November 30 at 8:00 a.m. and grades 9-12 on December 14 at 8:00 a.m., December 5th he will present to grades K-2 from 12:00 to 12:30 and grades 3-5 from 12:30 to 1:15. Please follow our school Facebook page for more information. Parents and interested community members will be welcome at these presentations and we encourage all parents to have conversations about the presentations with your students after the presentation.

Our Middle School Girls' Basketball Team is coming to the end of their season and they will be playing in their tournament this weekend (December 1st). The Middle School Girls' Basketball Team has had some real nail biting games with many of them going into overtime. They would really appreciate your support at the tournament. Practice has begun for Boys' and Girls' High School Basketball. We are looking forward to their seasons with excitement as they represent our community. Go Pioneers!

Some of our secondary students had the opportunity to attend a fieldtrip to the Heart Mountain Concentration Camp. The students learned history on-site and came away with new, rewarding perspectives. How wonderful that we have these types of opportunities to learn about the past.

Parent Notes

Persistence is key to success in school and in life

It's wonderful for students to be talented and smart, but educators know it's just as important for them to be persistent. At one time or another everyone faces a challenging task or a heartbreaking setback. The key is to remind children to keep trying until they are successful. Pushing forward—even when it's tough—is a key to success in school and in life.

To promote persistence in your child:

- Talk about it. How has persistence already helped your child?
 Maybe he learned to ride a bike or play an instrument. What new challenge can he tackle now?
- Break big goals into small parts.
 If your child is determined to raise his grade in English, support him by discussing steps and helping him develop a reasonable plan.
 - Offer encouragement. When your child is working on something challenging, say things like:
- I know you can do this.
- I bet you'll figure it out.
- You're making great progress. Keep at it. You'll get it.
- It will get better. You'll get the hang of it.
- If it doesn't work that way, try another way.
- Focus on the process. Sure, it feels great to see an A on a report card, but it also feels great to do well on a test after studying hard. Even better, it feels great to learn! Talk with your child about his accomplishments and what makes each of them worthwhile.

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A five-step process can help your child make better decisions

Want your middle schooler to make more responsible decisions? Encourage her to rely on this fivestep process whenever she's faced with a dilemma:

> 1. Assess the situation. Your child can't make a wise decision if the issue at hand seems murky. So remind her to clearly define it by asking herself, "What's the main thing I'm concerned about?" 2.Explore her options. What are some ways your child could handle the problem? Have her make a mental list, then narrow it down to the three most sensible choices. This list-making step is critical because it illustrates that there are usually several options for solving a problem. 3. Consider the disadvantages. Have your child think about the cons of each of her top three ideas. If a certain option has a particularly serious consequence, this is a good time to rule out that option. 4. Consider the advantages. Now ask your child to figure out the pros of her top choices. Does one option have major advantages over others? Then that may be the winner. 5.Decide on a solution. Now that she's weighed the pros and cons of each possible option, your child can make her

decision with confidence.

Emphasize attendance and help your high schooler stay focused

To help your teen stay focused and engaged:

- e Evaluate how her attendance has been over the first half of the school year. Is your teen arriving at school on time every day, ready to learn? Is she going to all of her classes? If not, help her set some attendance goals for the rest of the school year.
- Ask questions about what she's doing in school. Does she have assignments that she'll need to work on over winter break?
- Encourage her to make a checklist of everything she still has to do for school and extracurricular activities. This will help her stay organized during these final busy weeks.
- Remind her that school is her top priority. Explain that you can't get out of work one day just because it's close to the holidays; likewise, she can't miss school.



Adopt Agenda: Chuck Powell made a motion to approve the agenda. Seconded by Jane Thurston. Motion carried 4-0.
