# State FFA News

The Ten Sleep FFA Farm Business Management continued to find success at the Wyoming State FFA Convention, placing 6th overall in a highly competitive contest that tests advanced agricultural math and financial decision-making skills. The team, made up of freshmen Kyler Mills, Cachelynn Forshee, Liam Jordan, and Layne Jordan, demonstrated impressive skill and confidence throughout the competition season. Prior to state, the team placed 2nd at Sheridan Border Wars and 3rd at Casper College, building momentum heading into the state-level contest. A special thank you goes to Mr. Don Anderson for his support and coaching of the team throughout the season. His guidance played an important role in preparing these students for success at the state level.



The Ten Sleep FFA Greenhand Quiz Bowl team earned an impressive 4th place finish at the Wyoming State FFA Convention, demonstrating strong knowledge of FFA history, structure, and procedures in a highly competitive academic contest. The team consisted of Siri Smith, Liam Jordan, Cachelynn Forshee, Layne Jordan, and Kyler Mills. As a freshman-level team, they competed in a rigorous written examination format designed to test students' understanding of the Official FFA Manual, including topics such as the FFA Creed, emblem symbolism, official dress standards, degree requirements, officer duties, and overall FFA organization structure.



Ten Sleep FFA member Erik Harstad earned top honors in the Electrical Wiring portion of the Agricultural Mechanics competition at the Wyoming State FFA Convention, showcasing strong technical skill and precision in a highly specialized area of agricultural education. The Ten Sleep FFA Horse Evaluation team had a successful season, culminating in a 6th place overall finish at the Wyoming State FFA Convention. It was an honor to watch each of them walk across the stage to receive recognition that often goes unnoticed but represents years of perseverance and growth. Ten Sleep FFA member Kruze Forshee has been named the Wyoming FFA State Star Farmer, one of the most prestigious honors in agricultural education, recognizing excellence in production agriculture, business management, and leadership at the highest level in the state. This recognition places Kruze among the top production agriculture students in Wyoming and makes him Ten Sleep FFA's second State Star Farmer, following Amanda (Lewton) McMillan, who earned the honor in 2016.

# Counselor's Corner

It's hard to believe that May is here and summer plans are underway! Senior's last day is May 13! At graduation, traditionally, senior scholarships, awards, honors, and future plans are announced. That is, if students fill out my form and write something down that they would like read off at graduation....There has been some talk among staff about how to honor those not going to the traditional college. I would like to put it out there that staff does recognize, value, and respect all post-secondary plans. Just because it is not put on a "pedestal" during the graduation ceremony, does not mean that those choices are "less than". Starting in the 8th grade (formally) I talk to students about planning for their future; whether that is a trade, the workforce, or college, or another route. All choices are valid and accounted for. ## Sports Physicals For 2026-2027 School Year

### Sports Physicals



Adrienne S. O'Neal FNP-C will be offering sports physicals on Wednesday, May 13th for the 2026 - 2027 school year at Ten

Sleep School. If you would like your student to receive a physical with Adrienne, please complete the health history portion of the WHSAA School Physical Examination form, sign all three parent signature areas and return with payment to the front office. Extra forms will be available at the front office. Cost of the physical is \$25.00. Please make checks payable to Adrienne O'Neal. All students who would like to participate in Middle School or High School athletics next school year (5th-12th grade) will need to obtain a WHSAA approved physical before participating in any school sponsored athletic activity. Please obtain your physical before the start of the 2026-2027 school year.

## Student Immunizations for 2026-2027 School Year

Students ages 11-12 are required to receive the Tdap (Tetanus/Diphtheria/Pertussis) vaccine. Immunizations may be received from your healthcare provider or at Public Health by calling 307-347-3278 to make an appointment. Wyoming Law states all students must be up to date with required immunizations as outlined by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) Please provide updated immunization records to the school.

Two additional immunizations that are not required, but are recommended for children age 11-12 are the HPV (Human Papillomavirus) and Meningococcal (Bacterial Meningitis) vaccines. HPV helps prevent infections which can cause cancer. The Meningococcal vaccine helps prevent meningitis, a rare but severe infection of the lining of the brain and spinal cord, and infections of the blood. Please make sure your student is up to date on their immunizations before the start of school next fall.

## Sun Safety Reminders

Most weather Apps now include the UV Index, an important tool to help protect skin and eyes from damaging ultraviolet rays. Take precautions when the UV index is 3 or higher: SLIP on a shirt, SLOP on some sunscreen, SLAP on a hat and WRAP on sunglasses. Avoid prolonged exposure to the sun between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m., when UV rays are most intense. Use extra caution near water, snow, and sand as they reflect the damaging rays of the sun, which can increase the chance of sunburn.\* (AAD) Sunglasses that block 100% of UVA and UVB rays provide the greatest protection for your eyes and experts recommend broad-spectrum SPF 30+ for optimal protection to prevent UV damage, skin cancer, and aging. There are so many fun things to do outside in the summer! If you're headed out to play or work, remember to SLIP, SLAP, SLOP and WRAP.
