Preschool

If you have a child who will be 3 or 4 before September 15, 2018, they are eligible for Preschool. They must be potty trained. The class for four year olds is Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 7:58 A.M. to 11:00 A.M. The class for three year olds is Tuesday and Thursday from 7:58 A.M. to 11:00 A.M. If your child is 3 but not potty trained they may start whenever that happens. You will need to bring a birth certificate and immunizations records. We are really in need of 3 year olds so if you know of someone who might not see this, pass the word along.

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Note to Parents

When parents are overly involved in their children's social lives, their kids can't develop the confidence and resilience they need to thrive.

Swooping in and saving your child from every social challenge won't help her in the long run—it might actually hurt her.

Your child is more likely to establish healthy friendships and feel more sure of herself if she is armed with "social survival" skills. And these skills won't just help her navigate the playground successfully. They'll make her feel more confident in the classroom, too.

To help your child strengthen her social skills:

- Empower her to take action. If she comes to you with a problem, listen closely while she tells you about it. Say, "That sounds frustrating. What did you do next?" Then, give her a chance to find her own solution. Sometimes, all kids need is someone to listen to them.
- Model resilience. Talk about your own struggles and how you faced them. Studies show that when children hear stories about how family members overcame obstacles, they become more resilient in the face of challenges.

Teach her to be assertive. Help your child learn how to speak up for herself. When she wants something, ask her to make a strong case for it. Or, have a family debate night. When you encourage your child to speak up at home, she'll find her voice at school and in the world!

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Educators agree that respect is an important ingredient for success in the classroom. It's difficult for teachers to create a positive learning environment in the absence of respect.

Let your child know that everyone wants respect. When someone respects us, they act and speak in a way that shows us we are worthy. Our actions and opinions deserve consideration, even if the other person does not agree with them.

Teach your child to demonstrate respect by:

- Believing in herself. Respect begins with self-respect. Your child should act in ways that make her proud of herself.
- Being on time. Promptness demonstrates respect for people's time. Your child should arrive on time for classes and other commitments.
- Listening to and being polite to others. This includes parents, teachers and classmates.
- Being someone others can trust. Your child should do what she says she will do and be accountable for her actions. When she is working on group projects, she should always do her share.
- Understanding that learning is important. It is a way to better herself. Your child should pay attention in class and participate.

Realizing that she can learn from almost every person she meets. Your child should listen to what others have to say—even if she doesn't agree with what they're saying.

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
Your teen will have to make all kinds of decisions over the course of his high school career, from selecting classes to facing difficult peer pressure. Help him learn to make decisions that will enable him to succeed both academically and socially.

If your teen comes to you with a problem, walk through these steps:

1. Ask him to describe the situation he is facing. Ask open-ended questions that cannot be answered with just yes or no.
2. Discuss possible choices. Help your teen see different alternatives. Encourage him to make a pro/con list and evaluate the benefits and disadvantages of every option. Talk through how different consequences could affect his goals.
3. Allow your teen to make a decision and carry it out. Later, ask him what he learned from making that choice. Ask if he would make the same—or a different—decision if faced with a similar problem in the future.

Remember: While it may sometimes seem like your teen is challenging your values and beliefs, he still needs your support and guidance to make important decisions about his future. Teens often rebel as a way to assert their independence. But with your support and unconditional love, he will develop the judgment that will guide him to make responsible decisions.



Goodbye summer. Welcome fall! It's that time of year again, when the air is cooler, days are shorter and the autumn colors are blooming. Unfortunately it's also the start of the flu season. Protect yourself and your loved ones from the flu this season by getting your annual flu shot. According to the CDC, getting an annual flu vaccine is the first and best way to protect yourself and your family from the flu. They also report that, "You should get a flu vaccine before flu begins spreading in your community. It takes about two weeks after vaccination for antibodies that protect against flu to develop in the body, so make plans to get vaccinated early in fall, before flu season begins. CDC recommends that people get a flu vaccine by the end of October. Getting vaccinated later, however, can still be beneficial, even into January or later."

Washakie County School District #2 School Board Minutes August 13, 2018

The regular meeting of the Washakie County SD #2 Board of Trustees was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Vice-Chairperson Jared Lyman. Present were board members Jared Lyman, Terril Mills, and Jane Thurston. Absent were Tessia Greet and Chuck Powell. Also present were Superintendent Jimmy Phelps, Principal Levi Collins, Business Manager Connie Gay, Business Office Assistant Janet Collen and Administrative Assistant Neysha Lyman.

Pledge of Allegiance was led by Vice-Chairperson Jared Lyman.

Adopt Agenda: Jane Thurston moved to adopt the amended agenda with the following additions: Item 5 Letter H - remove the amended Speech Contract and replace with Approve Out of District Student; Item 6 Letter A- add Approve Out of State Travel for Middle School Football; all other items on the agenda will move down. Seconded by Terril Mills. Motion carried 3-0.

Annual Audit Report: Mr. Seckman reviewed the annual audit with the board and answered any questions.
